But during April's 10-hour blackout, these systems kept AC units humming. As hotel owner Anika put it: "Guests don't care about CEB's problems - they paid for beachfront luxury."

Future-Proofing Your Energy Needs

The Energy Ministry's draft policy aims for 70% renewable energy by 2030. What does that mean for early adopters? Possibly:

- Priority grid access during peak times
- Enhanced net metering buyback rates
- Property value increases (Solar homes sell 23% faster in Colombo)

But here's a curveball - new thin-film photovoltaic technology could revolutionize balcony solar installations.
